The Turbosound ip500 speakers and Behringer 8 channel mixer that Bill purchased from Sweetwater Music Instruments and Pro Audio in Ft. Wayne, Indiana for approximately \$1,700 also included all cables necessary to connect and deploy the system. The speakers are lightweight and are designed to project sound directionally to approximately 70 feet with normal volume. The mixer component board allows multiple inputs from various types of microphones, music players and computers and the speakers have Bluetooth stereo capability. Based on the feedback received from several members and



guests, everyone was able to hear the presentations and announcements clearly, even in the back of the tent and outside the tent.



It took a lot of careful planning and hard work to ensure that all the many details necessary for the success of the Annual Business Meeting, Elections, Picnic and Swap Meet were addressed. Many club members, employees and volunteers worked tirelessly to make sure everything went well. 

Message from the Manager

Hello Fellow Members,

The results are in, and we have a new Board of Directors going into our fiscal year 2023/2024. In case you are unaware, the club officers and board of directors are voted on yearly at the Annual Business Meeting and Picnic. That event occurred on Sunday May 21st, 2023. If you missed the event, you deprived yourself of a wonderful time and an opportunity to mingle with several hundred members of the club we love so much.

During the months that I have been in the position of Club Manager I have witnessed a wave of new members like the club has never seen before. Official Club Business

Highlights of the April 10 2023, Regular Board of Directors Meeting

President Will Owensby presided over a quorum of seven Board members. Also attending were the Club Manager, Assistant Club Manager, three club officers, three life members, eight annual members, one annual member spouse, and one life member spouse. The meeting was convened at 7:00PM on Monday, April 10, 2023. The meeting was held at RBGC's Gene Mowell Conference Center on club property.

A quorum was confirmed, the proposed agenda was adopted, the minutes of the March 13, 2023, Board meeting were approved, and the following officer and manager reports were presented and accepted:

Treasurer Secretary Chief Range Officer Club Manager Shotgun Manager

Board decisions made, actions taken, and items of interest:

- David Norcross presented the Treasurer's report and reported that March FYTD income was \$856K, a decrease of approximately \$2K versus the same period in FY 2022.
- March FYTD expense was \$792K, a decrease of approximately \$51K versus the same period in FY 2022.
- Cash in the bank as of 3/31/23 was \$332,271 including \$100,224 in Capital Reserve Fund and \$42,797 in Scholarship Fund.
- Club Secretary Erica D'Amico reported that the membership total as of April 6, 2023, was 2,321; 94 members more than this time last year.
- The number of Senior Members as of April 6, 2023, was 208; 8.96% of RBGC membership and 4 members more than this time last year.
- There were 10 members on the Life Membership Wait List at the beginning of the April 2023 meeting.
- Chief Range Officer James Garner reported that the Range Use Summary Report for March 2023 totaled 1,745 (1,438 members and 307 guests). This is a 15.5% decrease from last month, and a 14% decrease from this time last year.
- Eighteen venues submitted Match Use Summary Reports for March 2023. Total entries were 696 (271 members, 416 non-members, and 9 juniors). March match income was \$7,755.52 with \$2,265.00 reported to the club.
- New Member Orientation classes were held on March 26, March 27, and April 2 for a total of 44 attendees.
- There were 13 Tac Rifle Certifications, 0 NFA Certifications, 0 Supergun Certifications, and 0 Stop the Bleed Certifications in March 2023.
- Red 4x4 stakes will be installed on AP Bays 1, 2, 3; Cowboy Hill Bays 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11; and Center Fire Plinking Bays 1 & 2 to denote the 'firing line' positions. Range Rules will be updated to reflect changes.
- Bill Goode presented the Club Manager's report and reported that the Cowboy Bay 11 sign-in board, shooting table, trash container, and parking curbs were installed and the bay is now open for use.
- The access road to Silhouette target area has been regraded and graveled.
- A load of gravel was spread on AP 4&5 to fill puddle areas and boot scrubbers were installed at the top of the stairs on the AP complex as requested by CRO for safety.
- A new sign-in box was built and installed on the Rimfire Plinking Range.
- A sign-in box and post was repaired and reset on Hight Power 300-yard berm.
- New River Bend Gun Club signs were installed on Yellow Creek Road and Shiloh Road.
- New stairs were installed going to Reiber Bridge that were destroyed by downed tree from storm.
- We received two new shooting benches for the rimfire rifle range with the last two to be delivered next month.
- An order has been placed for AED replacement batteries to update units on schedule for battery replacement.
- Assistant Club Manager Greg Hughes presented the Shotgun Hill Manager's report and reported shotgun range use in March 2023 was 287 shooters (254 members and 35 guests). 1,297 rounds were fired during March with 45 cart rentals.

Total March revenue to the club was \$10,001.00.

- Member Communications Manager David Norcross reported that the April 2023 Bullet-IN reached 2,343 recipients with 2,339 successful deliveries (99.8%). Open rate was 1,696 (72.5%) and 706 (30.9%) members clicked through the newsletter.
- The 2023 Annual Meeting Announcement was delivered to 2,339 recipients with 2,337 successful deliveries (99.8%). Open rate was 1,601 (68.5%) and 156 (6.7%) clicked through.
- The Board approved 32 new members.
- The Board approved \$30,000 for the Cowboy Hill Bay Floor Renovation for Bays 3, 4 & 6. The Steel Challenge venue donated \$3,000.00 to the project, and the USPSA venue donated \$20,000 toward the project. Total cost for the project is \$51,150.00.
- The Board approved Christiaan Johnson as a member of the Membership Committee.
- Range Committee Chairman Jim Garner reported that the annual Range Committee meeting will convene on Sunday,
 August 13, 2023, at 9AM in the Gene Mowell Conference Center. Registration is required.
- Activities Chairman Pat Elliott-Pugh present the details of the Annual Picnic preparation. All is going according to plan and is on schedule.
- Infrastructure Committee Chairman Bill Good reported that Kings III completed service call and repairs were made to Silhouetter, Bullseye, and MP2 call boxes on 3/6/23. All boxes have been reported working since then.
- Will Owensby reported that he has submitted to Dawson County the application for the Land Conservation Status. It has been requested that 34.243 acres remain in Conservation Status and 20.74 acres be withheld from Conservation Status.
- Range Maintenance Committee Chairman Steve Hardin reported that the Baffles of Bullseye Range are rotting already; they are only 5 years old. The wood used was not pressure treated. Estimates will be obtained for repair/replacement.
- Scholarship Committee Chairman Ernie Knoche reported that Grace Beardsley is receiving the scholarship award.
- The Scholarship Committee is putting together a Fun Shoot on Shotgun Hill to raise money for the Scholarship Fund. The Fun Shoot is scheduled for Saturday, June 24, 2023, from 10AM-1PM. The cost is a \$30 donation for a round of Wobble or 5-Stand. There will be lunch and a raffle. Fun Shoot is open to members and non-members.
- Training Committee Chairman Jerry Rioux reported that the Training Committee met on Saturday, April 8.
- CPR and Stop the Bleed courses will be offered every other month by Jeff Fegreus.
- Tactical Rifle Certification is offered the 1st and 3rd Saturdays of the month.
- Training dates for 2024 need to be compiled by July for inclusion in the Range Meeting in August.
- The next Training Committee meeting is scheduled for Saturday, June 10, 2023, at 3PM in the Gene Mowell Conference Center.

Regular monthly Board meetings are called to order at 7:00 PM on the second Monday of each month in the Gene Mowell Conference Center. RBGC members and families are cordially invited to attend.

Rimfire Silhouette Match

The second match of the Rimfire Silhouette summer project has been completed.

The day started off with some light sprinkles about 7am continuing to about 8am. This was a bit concerning as the forecast for the area was rain expected midafternoon. The sprinkles left the area when range setup was started and the remainder of the day was very pleasant, with light wind and overcast skies keeping the temperature just about perfect.

Official Match Director Don Coleman is still recuperating from prior surgery, so he was not able to attend the match. Chris Sagar filled in as Acting Match Director for the event.



Participation for the match was a bit concerning. As of 8 am, no competitors had shown up. Shortly after, 4 shooters arrived for the match: Kirk Swanson, Al Dunn, Alan Rauber and Bob Morris. This was enough to have one animal color set up. Kirk Swanson convinced the Acting Match Director to use his extra Ruger Precision rifle and shoot in the match. The gauntlet was picked up and we had 5 competitors. Two color sets of animal targets were set up on the range.

At the end of the Hunter Rifle match, Kirk Swanson had a very good score of 24 for first place. Bob Morris came in second with a score of 16.

After taking a short break, we held the Standard Rifle match. After all the rounds were sent down range, Kirk Swanson was again in first place with an excellent score of 29. Second place was tied at 13 between Al Dunn and Bob Morris. All the equipment had been put away, so we resorted to a coin toss to break the tie. The tie breaker went to Al Dunn for 2nd place with a score of 13.

Notably, we had THREE "x in a row" strings shot. These are for shooting 5 or 10 targets in a row. In the Hunter Rifle match, Kirk Swanson had a 5 in 5 (5 hits with 5 shots) on the TURKEY targets and Al Dunn had a 5 in 5 on the RAM targets.

In the Standard Rifle match, Kirk posted a 10 in 10 on the PIG targets. Congratulations to Kirk and Al on the outstanding achievements. The award for these is an NRA official pin showing the string and animal. For this, Kirk gets a 5 TURKEY pin and a 10 PIG pin and Al gets a 5 RAM pin. Unfortunately, we don't have the 10 PIG pin and will order one for Kirk.

<u>Rimfire Silhouette</u> is a sport where we shoot at metallic animals to knock them down. We shoot chickens at 40 meters, pigs at 60 meters, turkeys at 77 meters and rams at 100 meters. If you want to try some fun and challenging shooting, come out and shoot with us.

The next match will be on June 17. Our shooting schedule is the 3rd Saturday of each month thru October.

Rimfire Benchrest Match

Twelve shooters were on-hand for the out-of-cycle May Rimfire Benchrest Match. Scheduled to accommodate the Black Hawk Open, the May Rimfire Benchrest match is typically held early in the month than its regularly scheduled fourth Sunday. This year, the course of fire was four cards at 100 yards with all classes firing on the same target – the IBS 200-yard Hunter target.

The day began with gray and slightly foggy conditions which gave way to bright sunshine with variable winds. While frustrating, the winds were shootable with three shooters firing clean targets and multiple others scoring 248 or higher with four and five X's.

After the safety briefing, the 10-minute sight-in period got underway at 9:30, followed by the first record card.

With only one Unlimited class shooter present, there was little drama in the class results. Without sufficient shooters to form a class, Simon

Bailey posted an aggregate 997-18X (out of 20'x's possible) to finish as Lonesome Unlimited, a finish position that does not have a monetary prize.



Four shooters made up the factory class, with George Wilson, using his 1950's vintage Remington Model 37, jumping out to a two-point lead over Alan Rauber and his 1950's vintage BSA International, 245-1X to 242-1X. After the first card, Wilson improved slightly while Rauber slipped slightly. Wilson Posted a pair of 247's followed by a 241 to finish as 1st Factory with a 980-6X aggregate to Rauber's final 955-9X.

In the Precision class, Dave Rabin with his Anschutz 1913 jumped out to an early lead with a 249-5X over Ken Bowles 246-2X effort using his CZ 457 and Lilja barrel, Steve Hickom and his Kimber 82G posted a 245-3X

and Bob Morris and his modified CZ-457 fired a 245-2X. The second stage saw Rabin fire a 250-2X to hold onto 1st, while Bowles maintained 2nd with a 243-1X. First time shooter Tom Brakebill, with his Kimber 82G, fired a 246-2X to move into 3rd.

After the third stage, Rabin had a solid lead with a 748-12X aggregate. Steve Hickom moved into 2nd with a 731-11X aggregate over 3rd place Brad Garrett's 729-6X.

The final stage saw Rabin post a 249-2X to secure 1st Precision with a 997-14X. Hickom finished strong with a 250-4X to secure 2nd Precision, while Garrett secured 3rd finishing with a 245-2X.

May 2023 Match Report

While not the highest scoring match ever, the second match of the 2023 River Bend NRA Light Rifle season was certainly close and exciting with several places separated by only a point. The match was held under cool gray skies with almost no wind – almost perfect conditions. Ten shooters were on-hand with two youth shooters, one returning from a long hiatus.

After the usual safety briefing and review of the match procedures, firing commenced by 9:30 with the usual ten-minute sight-in period. Shooting for record then commenced.

As in the April match, Brad Reynolds started out well by firing an 88.0 and an 89.01 to hold first place after the second stage by one point over Mauro Bisiacchi's 86.0 and 90.0 efforts. Junior Xander Massengill, steadily improving with each match, posted an 88.01 and an 85 to move into third place. Brads better half, Beth Reynolds, also starting out well moved into 1st Marksman with a 172.01 snd stage aggregate, one shot ahead of David Massengill.







The next two stages resulted in a shake up in the standings as Bisiacchi posted a pair of 89's to move into 1st place with a 354.0 aggregate. The Reynolds family continued to do well, with Brad Reynolds holding 2nd place with a 351.01 and Beth who shot a match high 93.0 in the 4th stage to tally a 346.01 and move into 3rd place overall.

Xander slipped one point behind Beth to move into 1st Marksman five points ahead of dad, David, while Paul Lemley slowly and surely climbed the leaderboard another six points back.

The final two stages resulted in a final change in leaders, with Xander posting his first ever score over 90 with a 91.0 followed by a 91.01 to secure first place with a 527.04 aggregate. Brad Reynolds held on to second place only one point back at 526.01. Bisiacchi suffered a slight setback in the 5th stage but managed to take third place with a 520.0.

Due to our country's legal environment, your receipt of this article and any use you make of the information in this article are subject in every respect to the limitations and conditions language at the end of the article.

I believe strategically full-length resizing rifle brass in conjunction with periodic annealing can produce the best ammunition consistency returns for the time expended, regardless of the shooting venue. These fundamental steps also serve as the foundation for additional reloading procedures that also successfully produce incrementally better ammunition consistency/ accuracy.

Both annealing and strategic full-length resizing occur as initial steps in the reloading process, followed by case trimming and chamfering. There are simple things that can be done after trimming that improve ammunition consistency to further enhance the prospect of better accuracy. These simple steps are presented in this chapter. If you choose to implement the modified/supplemental brass resizing methods that will be presented in a subsequent chapter, the following steps should be considered necessary to max out the benefit of these modified resizing methods. This chapter also presents brass preparation steps to enhance ammunition consistency that are typically performed prior to fire forming, but can also be done to your current brass if you so choose.

Be Advised: Implementing the reloading procedures presented in this chapter and all subsequent chapters will likely change both the point of impact on the target (may have to rezero) and the group size. In terms of group size, "change" could be either better or worse...... but you should be prepared for "worse". As such, I expect some load tuning could be required, such as powder charge/seating depth adjustment. I also expect that the group obtained after such tuning will be consistently smaller than the original one.

Picture 7-1 depicts the tools and equipment that will be discussed in conjunction with the procedures presented in this chapter. Top to bottom:

- flash hole deburring tool
- primer pocket uniforming tool
- VLD inside neck chamfer tool
- case chuck with appropriate shell holder
- outside neck chamfer tool
- 000-steel wool
- bronze brush wrapped with 000-steel wool

Flash hole deburring tool: this tool is used to remove flash hole "brass boogers" that can be present inside the case on its base, caused during fabrication of the flash hole. These "boogers" act as fins that cause variable flame fronts from primer ignition. These variable flame fronts cause variable pulse. American-manufactured brass typically have flash holes that are punched. Accordingly, all have "boogers", some of which are really nasty. Scandinavian/European brass have flash holes that are drilled, but occasional, modest "boogers" can be encountered.

Deburring flash holes is a one-time step. Insert the tool into the case mouth and place the cutter in the flash hole. Center the tool in the case mouth and turn the tool by hand until the cutting action feels smooth. Any flash hole deburring tool should have provisions for centering the tool in the case mouth and limiting the cutting depth.

I consider flash hole deburring a worthwhile brass preparation step for all shooting venues, and fundamental for target venues. For velocity extreme-spread freaks (you know who you are), this step should be considered mandatory.

Primer pocket uniforming tool: this tool is used to cut a square-bottomed primer pocket to a uniform depth. All brass, regardless of origin, have variable-depth and rounded-bottom seating surfaces. Using this tool provides a uniform, orthogonal surface to the firing pin axis, a flush surface onto which the primer can be seated/uniformly supported, and uniform firing pin travel necessary for a consistent pulse.

Primer pocket uniforming is a one-time step that I believe should be done after fire forming. Unless you are into masochistic rituals and are related to King Kong, uniforming primer pockets should be done with a drill. Chuck the cutter into a drill, and use a chamber-specific case holder to enable a better grip on the case. (Picture 7-2) Use a magic

marker and fully color the case rim. Insert the cutter into the primer pocket and rotate the cutter on the drill's low speed. Continue to cut until a uniform, circular section of the case rim has had the magic marker color worn away. (Picture 7-3)

Primer pocket uniforming should be considered a fundamental brass preparation step for all benchresters and all target shooters in competitions with targets beyond 300 yards. For velocity extreme-spread freaks, again consider this a mandatory step.

VLD inside neck chamfer tool: this tool is used to ease the transition surface on the inside of the case mouth to reduce bullet jacket trauma during seating. The shallow-angle cutter chamfers the neck to reduce the potential for scoring the bullet's bearing surface, particularly if a steel wool polish of the case neck's interior is performed (process subsequently discussed). Some scoring of the bullet's jacket is inevitable from seating, and the intent of this step is to limit its severity and extent.

In my opinion, the preferred way to chamfer the neck's interior is by hand. The shallow cutting angle of the tool results in an aggressive cutting rate that can be difficult to control otherwise.

After the case has been trimmed, inset the cutter into the case mouth. Slowly rotate the cutter, and continue to rotate until the cutting action is judged to be smooth. From four to six "turns of the wrist" (not complete, 360 degree turns of the tool) are typically required for an initial chamfer; from two to four are typically required thereafter. The resulting chamfer surface should be easily visible to the naked eye, and a suggested width should be on the order of 0.030 to 0.050 inches.

Power trimmers can have adjustable chamfer cutters that produce indeterminant chamfer angles. I believe a follow-up, inside neck chamfer with a VLD tool is a worthwhile, supplemental step. Furthermore, I believe inside neck chamfering with a VLD tool is worthwhile for all shooting venues.

Case chuck with case-specific shell holder: this tool is used in conjunction with (among others) the outside neck chamfer tool and the 000-steel wool.

Outside neck chamfer tool: this tool is used as "standard practice" to chamfer the outside of the case neck after trimming. However, based on one "how to" video from a prominent vender, I suspect that most folks do not chamfer the outside of the case neck to what I believe is a sufficient extent simply because they do it by hand. In my opinion, the outside chamfer width should also be about 0.030 to 0.050 inches to facilitate resizing the neck, particularly if a neck-sizing bushing is used.

Crafting a chamfer of the suggested width range is easily accomplished by first chucking the brass in the case chuck, then turning the brass on the low speed of a drill while using the chamfer tool. A three-count is typically satisfactory for producing the suggested width range.

000-steel wool: this material is used to remove any residual brass kerf caused by the chamfering process and then transition blend both inside and outside chamfers on the case neck. 000-steel wool is a reasonable compromise between cutting and polishing.

While the case is still in the case chuck, clean/polish the outside neck and shoulder area of the case. I typically use a three to six-count at low speed.

Bronze brush wrapped in 000-steel wool: this is where old, caliber-specific bronze brushes go to die. Chuck a 000-steel wool-encased brush into a drill and insert the brush into the case mouth. Rotate the brush at low speed. Hold the drill steady while cycling the case back-and-forth.

Hot Tip: Unwind a pad of steel wool and tear it into chunks no more than three to four inches long. Divide the chunks in half, thickness-wise. From this divided chunk, further tear off a strand about ½ to ½ inch wide (Picture 7-4). Progressively thread the strand onto the brush as it rotates at a very slow speed. Increase the steel wool thickness with additional strands until all the bronze bristles have been covered. Refresh as necessary. As you cycle the case mouth back-and-forth over the brush, hold it over a trash container to catch the steel wool waste.

For many of you, one simple back-and-forth cycle of the case neck to remove any residual kerf can be considered sufficient simply because polishing case neck interiors is tedious and a time black hole. In my opinion, benchresters and long-range target shooters will be well-served by polishing the case neck interiors to a consistent sheen. Doing so enhances neck tension uniformity

(as confirmed by my mad-science, instrumented load cell testing performed while seating bullets).

An attendant benefit of polishing case necks is it also reduces the degree of bullet scoring caused by the seating process. I believe the degree and extent of bullet scoring likely affects bullet concentricity. Conceptually, variations in concentricity caused by scoring result in subtle, varying degrees of down-range bullet yaw that affect the bullet's point of impact (POI). Any such variations in POI can be considered inconsequential for most shooting venues, but may not be when group sizes are measured to the nearest 0.0001 inch.

Unless you seat bullets with an arbor press with about a 4-inch handle and religiously measure bullet seating depth to the nearest 0.001 inch, you have no real appreciation for the variability in seating force (neck tension) that is typically encountered when seating bullets into unpolished case necks. If you haven't already played an irrevocable BS card to this neck polishing notion, I invite you to slowly polish a couple of case neck interiors and assess what you discover. By slowly, I mean take no more than one back-and-forth pass of the brush at one time. After each brushing cycle sequence, view the case neck interiors with a strong light. The sheen should initially be noticeably variable, indicating both a variable (undulating) brass neck surface due to variations in the case neck thickness and vertical striations (gouges) in the brass caused by the expander ball used with a full-length resizing die. With continued cycling, the sheen should become progressively brighter and more uniform as the higher surfaces within the neck are worn down so that the majority of the surface is in contact with the brush. Polishing case neck interiors to a consistent sheen is a

back-handed, poor man's way of inside neck reaming to achieve a more consistent/uniform brass-to-bullet contact area, resulting in a more uniform neck tension.

Still skeptical? (I suspect most of you are, with added comments concerning someone's esoteric picking of nits) If so, seat several bullets in both polished and unpolished resized case necks. As best you can, qualitatively assess the effort and variability of effort needed to seat the bullets in polished vs unpolished case necks. Extract the bullets and assess the degree of bullet scoring associated with polished vs unpolished case necks. Based on these tactile and visual assessments, you can make an informed decision on whether polishing the interior of case necks will likely have any tangible accuracy benefit based on your shooting venue and if the anticipated time required to polish the neck interiors is worth it. All the targets presented in the previous chapters were shot using brass with polished necks.




