September 11, 2021 will be the 20th anniversary of the horrific terrorist attacks by Islamic extremists on the Twin Towers of the World Trade Center in New York City, the Pentagon in Washington D.C. and the failed attempt to crash United Airlines flight 93 into an unknown target. Official Club Business

Highlights of the July 12, 2021 Board of Directors Meeting

President Will Owensby presided over a quorum of eight Board members. Also attending were three club officers, the Club Manager, the Assistant Club Manager, and the Shotgun Hill Manager. The meeting was convened at 7:00PM on Monday, July 12, 2021. The meeting was held at RBGC's Gene Mowell Conference Center on club property.

A quorum was confirmed, the proposed agenda was adopted, the minutes of the June 14, 2021 Board meeting were approved, and the following officer and manager reports were presented and accepted:

Treasurer Secretary Chief Range Officer Club Manager Shotgun Manager

Board decisions made, actions taken, and items of interest:

- Treasurer Geoff Rhines reported that June FYTD income was \$968K, an increase of approximately \$42K versus the same period in FY 2020.
- June FYTD expense was \$1,012K, an increase of approximately \$114K versus the same period in FY 2020.
- Cash in the bank as of 6/30/21 was \$524,411 including \$100,206 in Capital Reserve Fund.
- Club Secretary Erica D'Amico reported that the membership total at the beginning of the June 2021 meeting was 2,169.
- The number of Senior Members in July 2021 was 199 (9.17% of RBGC membership).
- There are currently 22 members on the Life Membership Wait List.
- Chief Range Officer Jim Garner presented the CRO report and reported that 19 of 20 venues submitted Match Use Summary Reports for June. Total entries were 415 (210 members, 193 non-members, and 12 juniors). June match income was \$6,195 with \$1,213 reported to the club.
- Range Use Summary Report for June totaled 1,563 (1,328 members and 235 guests).
- There was a New Member Orientation (NMO) class held on June 27 for 25 of the 29 registered attendees.
- There were 9 Tac Rifle Certifications in June.
- Dave Harrington was recommended and approved as Bullseye ARO.
- Marc Schneider was recommended and approved as IDPA ARO.
- Club Manager Bill Illg reported that the HP tree removal project has been completed.
- Galloway Construction and Consulting is making good progress on the Shotgun Hill renovation.
- The Cowboy Hill paving project has been completed.
- The dueling tree on Cowboy Bay 9 has been repaired.
- New signs regarding the rule changes for the Silhouette and Cowboy ranges were installed.
- Signs allowing driving to the HP 200-yard line are up.
- The Club's membership to the National Sport Shooting Foundation has been renewed.
- Two new plate racks were delivered.
- The flag at the entrance to the Club has been replaced.
- Shotgun Hill Manager Bill Wettingfeld reported that shotgun range use in June was 278 shooters (259 members and 195 guests). 1,212 rounds were fired during the month with 20 cart rentals. Total June revenue to the club was \$7,571.
- The Board approved 15 new members and reinstated 2 members.
- Facilities Committee Chairman Art Thompson requested \$16,000 to complete the High Power scoring shed project. The board approved the request.
- Infrastructure Committee Chairman Bill Illg reported that the Jim Hinkle Rimfire Range cold range indicator lights are now running on 12v power to negate the effects of a power outage. This will provide 3 days of use during an outage.
- Membership Database and Renewal Automation Committee Chairman David Norcross reported that of the 2,169 active members, 305 have not logged on yet.

August 2021 Light Rifle Match Report

As usual, the August Light Rifle tournament consisted of two 30 shot matches, the first an "Irons Only" match affectionately known as the "Gary Brockmiller Commemorative Match", followed by a 30 shot any sight match.

The weather was typical for this time of year and 13 competitors were on-hand to shoot, including Mr. Brockmiller himself who was visiting Virginia and came prepared to shoot his namesake match. While all shooters are welcome to shoot the Irons only match, only eight competitors used metallic sights and thus fired for record. All shooters using scopes had their targets scored,

but not recorded.





Shooting at 50 yards offhand at a 1" 10-ring is very challenging and results in almost every shooter throw's a shot or so wide completely missing the scoring ring now and then. This match was no exception and even the best shooters put holes in the non-scoring white now and then.

As the shooters were gathering, an unwelcome and annoying noise could be heard in the distance to the left of the firing line. With no creature making itself visible, the Irons only match got underway.

Predictably, George Wilson jumped out to an early lead firing a solid 81-1X besting the field by a solid 10 points. While the second stage targets were being hung and the first stage was being scored a very large yellow bee carrying a long stinger emerged over the left side of the range over the power line.

By the start of the 2nd stage, the bee had gone back to its hive and silence reigned for a few minutes. Unfortunately, the silence lasted for only a few shots and the angry bee rose from behind the back berm and continued to brandish its stinger against the trees along the power line. A cease fire was called and lasted for over 30 minutes while the insect swept back and forward just beyond the berm.

Unknown to any of us present, and in defiance of what would appear to be common sense, it appears that it is an acceptable practice to bolt a long (and I mean long) cutting assembly to the bottom of a helicopter and then use that contraption to trim trees along the edge of a power line. While it would seem that this practice would quickly lead to Darwinian "thinning of the heard" involving a large bolt of electricity and a flaming helicopter crashing to the ground, no such spectacle occurred and eventually the Angry Bee, still carrying its stinger, flew off down the powerline to the right and out of sight allowing the match to continue.



After the interruption, Mauro Bisiacchi fired an 81-0X while George Wilson fired one of those misses previously mentioned, to allow Bisiacchi to take over 1st place. Matt Whitley took control of third place ahead of Bob Morris by one X – 139-2X over 139-1X.

The third stage saw a pair of 84's from Wilson and Bisiacchi and an 87 from the Match namesake Brockmiller to settle the final lineup with:

Match two got underway as conditions quieted. With the Angry Bee gone, peace returned, and with Optical Sights back in use, scores increased. All 13 shooters were now in the match and shooting for record.

Simon Bailey, now able to see what he was aiming at, fired a solid 85-2X to jump out into the lead over Bisiacchi who posted an 83.0X. Bob Morris took over 3rd place with an 81-0X. In the second stage, the three top shooters all fired 81's keeping things close and positions unchanged. Wilson was not done, however, and fired an 86-1X to start moving up the scoreboard.

The final stage shuffled the standings substantially. Bailey had a reasonable stage going until his last shot when an unwelcome lapse in concentration caused a shot to drop out of the scoring rings. Morris also suffered a 10 point deficit when he thought he had a double but had fired only 9 record shots.

Bisiacchi's final effort of 78-1X moved him into first place with Bailey's 75-1X good enough for second. Wilson fired an 80.0 to end in a tie with Morris, who's 77-1X led to the tie score of 239-1X. The tie was settled by scores on the bulls in reverse order fired, with Wilson taking 3rd place while Morris placed as 1st Sharpshooter.

Rimfire Benchrest Match Report

Overcast skies and almost liquid air greeted the 12 competitors on-hand for the fifth RBGC Rimfire Benchrest match of 2021. Setting up the equipment led to sweat soaked shirts, but the cloudy conditions led one very misguided competitor to predict low winds for the entire match.

The match format for the day was four stages at 50 yards using the RBA target for the Unlimited class and the IBS 50 target for the Factory and Semiauto classes, with the 12 shooters on hand allowing formation of these three classes.

If you have followed these matches previously, you are likely aware that most of the drama occurs among the Unlimited shooters, with very tight scores and matches often settled only by a point or so while the other classes are often dominated by a single shooter. This month things were just a little different.

In the unlimited class, Grant Toman rejoined the action this month with his aptly named rifle Enigma - a Broughton 4C barrel mated to an amazingly well tuned X-III action firing mid-grade Eley Team ammo. Despite some very tricky winds, the gun simply didn't know how to fire a bad shot and Grant posted his first 250 of the day along with 18 X's. Next up was Pat Patterson, also with an X-III but wearing a Muller barrel and firing Eley Match, who posted a 248-14X. In third was John McBrayer who used his Vudoo VS22/Lothar-Walther combo and Center-X to post a 247-15X.

In Factory class, Drew McKay using his Lithgow 101 again dominated with a 248-12X over closest competitor Phill Bettis using his CZ457, managed a 235-10X. In the Semiautomatic class, Shaun Forgacs and his Green Mountain barreled Ruger 10/22 put up a strong 249-7X with Paul Lemley and his new Brownells action mated to a KSA barrel fired a matching 249-7X.

The winds kicked up for the second and third cards with the wind flags providing almost unreadable feedback. Periodically, sunshine broke through the clouds causing a significant upset in the conditions and making a bad situation even worse, but clouds prevailed and tamed some of the chaos. Patience was rewarded with periods of readable conditions with some very shootable periods of left wind followed by stronger right wind. The stronger conditions required some courage to shoot through, but good results were possible, and many shooters used almost the entire time period to make all of their shots.

Toman advanced with a pair of 250-17X's to keep his clean score alive. Patterson posted a 248-14X and a 249-17X to hold second, while Simon Bailey's 2500X/Mullerworks setup settled down managing a 248-15X and a 248-16X to move up to third.

In Factory class, McKay posted a clean 250-9X and a 248-7X to hold first place after three cards while the Semiauto class duel between Forgacs and Lemley continued. After the second card, Forgacs had moved ahead on X count with both scoring 247's – Forgacs with 10X's to Lemley's 6X. On the third card Forgacs fired his first clean target ever, moving a couple of points ahead posting a 250-8X to Lemley's very solid 248-6X.

And then the rains came. Not a drenching rain, but a steady shower that started just as firing on the fourth card began and ended about the time firing was complete.

Toman completely fell apart on the fourth card and dropped two whole points to spoil his chance at four cleans is a row. Seriously though, he missed a couple of very fast wind reversals – and there were many – to end as first Unlimited with a 998-62X. Patterson managed a 247-14X for second and. McBrayer finished on a 248-12X for third.

McKay finished his domination of the Factory class finishing with a 248-8X while in the Semiauto class Forgacs and Lemley kept it interesting. Forgacs secured the match by one point over Lemley by posting a 249-10X, but Lemley took it to the wire by finishing with his own clean 250-9X to end only one point down.

Considering the weather, there sure were a lot of 250's on the scoreboard this month!
